Spare yourself the stress of last-minute rushing—just follow our multi-year, step-by-step plan

WHAT TO DO WHEN YOU'RE IN GRADES 198-10

Consider what you might be interested in studying: many colleges and universities offer advice on what courses to take at the start of high school to ensure you meet admission requirements later on

Get involved in extracurricular activities: not only do they help land scholarships, they're useful for finding passions and potential careers

O Discuss affordability of post-secondary education with your parents; find a part-time job if you are expected to contribute to

the cost of an education

### September

- Ovisit your school counsellor and talk to your teachers about picking a major; review what courses you've taken and what prerequisites you need for college or university
- Ocontinue extracurricular activities



Olf you haven't applied, use the Christmas break to apply to school: the first wave of deadlines is in January, and it comes quicker than you'd expect

#### November

- Deadlines for some scholarship applications; be aware of specific dates
- Give your references plenty of time to write letters of recommendation

#### October

- Though dates vary widely by program, it's now possible to apply to Canadian schools
- Many provinces have a central service (OUAC, ApplyBC, ApplyAlberta) to apply to multiple schools simultaneously; know their deadlines and be sure to print out your confirmation





#### March

- Depending on when you applied, letters of admission start to arrive
- Know how and when to register for classes; details will be provided in your offer-ofadmission letter; read through all the material included in the package
- O Let your school know your housing preference; some residence applications are first come, first served, so make sure

you know the deadlines; if you'd like to live off-campus, visit your school's student housing service website to find listings and potential roommates

Bursary deadlines tend to happen a month or so after early admissions; if you think you qualify, take the time to apply



#### April

Look for work or volunteer experience

### May

- O Different provinces begin accepting loan applications at different times; you can usually still apply up to a certain period after classes have started, but that won't help you pay your first tuition bill
- Attend your school's transition programs (such as academic advising and school tours)

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Work hard: strong Grade 11 marks could help you obtain an early offer of admission

#### October

Olf interested in U.S. schools, register for the SAT, offered four or five times a year; dates are posted at CollegeBoard.org



#### January

- OUpdate your counsellor about your grades, extracurriculars and future aspirations
- O Look for money: explore opportunities for scholarships from local organizations, business groups and even your part-time employer

#### February

- O Do some deep research into individual programs: find out about a program's prerequisites and early admission dates, as well as scholarship opportunities
- OPick your Grade 12 courses: know prerequisites for your postsecondary programs of choice
- Quebec students: apply to CEGEP; some have two or three admissions deadlines per year

#### September

- Narrow your choice of programs to a handful; know these programs' application and scholarship deadlines; cut-off dates can vary significantly depending on where you're applying
- Visit the schools you want to attend, either at an open house or a pre-booked tour
- Attend individual university information sessions and university fairs
- Continue applying for scholarships

#### May

OPrepare your scholarship applications (personal statements, essays, resumé, references); it's a timeconsuming process, so block off time and have someone proofread your work

# August

OUpdate your portfolio with Grade 11 marks, plus any work and extracurricular experience

### March

- Ouse the March break to tour the campuses of your prospective schools
- Attend career and education fairs to explore options; be on the lookout for programs you haven't heard of

# April

○ Look for a summer job or volunteer opportunity; these will help your resumé and allow you to explore possible career options

## June

Oheck your institution's website for deposit and fee deadlines

### August

- Make a checklist of everything you need for your dorm or offcampus housing
- Ocontact future roommate(s); coordinate who is to bring what for your shared accommodation
- ODo back-to-school shopping
- Start packing

O Look at the course calendar and choose your courses as soon as possible—getting into the classes you want, in the time slot you want, may require preparation
